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Are you ready to share a million stories? World Book Day 2020 has the theme 'share a million stories'. As World Book Day encourages a love for literature, it's only fitting we welcome children to bring their favourite characters to life. The annual celebration of authors, illustrators, books and reading is one of our favourite days of the year and we hope to share some of the fantastic creations in our next newsletter.

Children of all ages will be encouraged to read together at school and expand on their love for books, literacy and the joy of reading for Shanklea students is regardless of ability. The goal is for our students to experience a variety of quality literature and nonfiction, while increasing reading comprehension and promoting collaboration and teamwork. Teams of students will read, discuss, and practice quizzing each other and will answer questions in a variety of formats and with varying levels of difficulty.

Welcome to the extraordinary world of storytelling in schools. This week our Year 5/6 pupils met best selling author Julie Pike this week. She talked about life as an author and her new book "The Last Spell Breather." The children learnt about the stories that have inspired her and how her own adventures inspired her to write a story filled with high stakes and personal challenges. She talked about the power of words and how they came to be the basis of the magic system in her story, before inviting children to take part in an interactive spell building activity.

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Latest government advice regarding Covid-19, coronavirus

On Tuesday, the Coronavirus action plan was launched. This document sets out what the UK as a whole has done to tackle the Coronavirus (COVID-19), and what it plans to do next.

Action plan overview

The action plan sets out a four phased approach in response to the Coronavirus – Contain, Delay, Mitigate, and Research. An approach designed by world leading experts.

As there are already cases in the UK, the current emphasis is on the Contain and Research phases, but planning for Delay and Mitigation is already in train.

As part of the **Contain phase**, The government has been providing advice about educational settings in England, which can be found on Public Health England's website. A DfE helpline has been launched to manage the flow of increasing queries, from providers parents and young people.

Personal hygiene is the most important way we can tackle COVID-19, especially washing hands more; and the catch it, bin it, kill it strategy for those with coughs and sneezes – also help in delaying the peak of the infection.

The action plan is a framework that outlines the types of options open to government in each of these four phases. But this document is only a list of the types of measures we could consider – not those we are planning to implement.

Current advice remains in place: No school should close in response to a suspected (or confirmed) COVID-19 case unless advised to do so by Public Health England.

The importance of hygiene

Yesterday, the Department of Health and Social Care launched a public information campaign that focuses on the importance of handwashing. Washing hands for 20 seconds is central to prevent and slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).
